Bob and his late wife, Harriett, were the first residents of Bayshore Village. They moved from Chatsworth, California, in December 1985, after Bob retired



from a career as a nuclear engineer with North American-Rockwell Corporation. At that time, there were only of 24 homes and the Clubhouse.

Bob lived through the trials and tribulations of the early years of Bayshore Village in which each of the three phases of our complex faced major completion challenges. He served as the first HOA President and eventually held every office on the Board of Directors. Bob authored our first bylaws, rules and regulations. Up until last year, he was a member of the Budget and Finance Committee, having served on that Committee since its inception.

Among Bob's interests is music. He plays the bassoon in the Morro Bay Whitecaps Band as well as in the San Luis Obispo County Band. And, he collects antique music

boxes and has a beautiful collection at his home.

Robert Walter Wiese passed away in Santa Maria, California on September 13, 2018, at the age of 97.

of five children born to Walter and Erma Wiese, Bob was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on January 2, 1921.

He attended Iowa State University where he earned a degree in Chemical Engineering and found the love of his life, Harriet Grace Swift. The two were married for over 60 years until her passing in 2005.

After college he joined the U.S. Marine Corps and was stationed during WWII in Tientsin, China with the III Amphibious Corps Topographic Company. Following the war, he moved to Los Angeles, California with his wife and growing family. He worked for various energy related companies such as Rockwell International where he oversaw the development of technologies for alternative sources of energy including nuclear reactors, solar collectors, ocean temperature differentials and wave action.

Bob retired to Morro Bay, California where he lived for 30 years and could be seen strolling along the beach with his dog by his side. He loved music and played both the piano and bassoon.

At age ninety, he was still performing at local parks and gatherings as president of the White Caps and a member of the San Luis Obispo County Band. Bob's love of music and fascination with engineering inspired his collecting and tinkering with a wide variety of antique music boxes.

Bob is survived by three of his four children as well as grandchildren and great-grandchildren. His good humor, gentle nature, and insightful advice will be missed by all who knew and loved him.
